

Since then, she's been updating the menu, adding delivery options, and dreaming up new ways to serve Pueblo. "We want to keep what people love, but grow with the times," she says.

The Power of Scholarships

Jacelyn credits her CSU Pueblo experience—and her current success—to the financial freedom that scholarships provided. She received the Kane Family Foundation Scholarship, along with academic and athletic awards while competing in javelin and softball.

A Business Education in Real Time

Jacelyn's degrees gave her a foundation, but running the bakery has been a true crash course. From learning how to prep dough for croissants to managing orders and inventory, she's building skills daily.

"I walked in thinking I knew it all. I learned fast—it takes a team." She also recently invested in an embroidery machine and hopes to expand into merchandise. "Hopscotch is my sandbox for learning," she says. "It's where I get to test ideas and grow."

Looking Forward

Jacelyn's goals include streamlining operations, building a website, and one day franchising the bakery. But she's taking it one step at a time.


"Nothing is ever out of reach. You just have to figure out how to do it."

From "Just Visiting" to Home

When Larry and Barbara Johnson moved to Pueblo, Colorado, it was supposed to be temporary. But more than a decade later, the couple has not only stayed, they've become some of CSU Pueblo's most devoted fans, volunteers, and community ambassadors.

"You know how much fun it is to feed people?" Larry said with a grin.

In addition to sports, the Johnsons enjoy dining at Einstein Bros., Starbucks, and Qdoba on campus, often with their two teddy bears, Mr. Beeps and Pookie, in tow.

"They're great icebreakers," Barbara said.

"People always come up to ask about them."

Investing in Students

But it's not just the games or the coffee. What keeps Larry and Barbara involved is their belief in the university's mission.

"CSU Pueblo does a really good job preparing students for real life," Larry said.


From public speaking at team lunches to learning personal finance, the Johnsons believe students here gain both academic and practical skills.

SETTING THE EXAMPLE:

How Scholarships Help Ethan Bernabei
Build a Future for His Family

When Ethan Bernabei first joined CSU Pueblo, it wasn't as a student. It was as the voice on the other end of the line, serving as the university's campus operator. For 12 years, he had worked in retail, a job that paid the bills but didn't feed his sense of purpose. When the opportunity came to join the CSU Pueblo community as staff, he saw more than a job. He saw a pathway to something greater.

"I read a statistic that said if a parent has a college degree, their child is more likely to go to college too," Ethan said. "That stuck with me. I want my son to see what's possible."

Now an online student in the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration program through Extended Studies, Ethan is balancing many roles including full-time employee, student, husband to Jasia, and dad to three-year-old Kai. As a first-generation college student whose mother didn't finish high school, pursuing higher education is not just about his own future. It is about setting an example.

"In high school, college wasn't really talked about for me," Ethan said. "I want my son to grow up knowing it's an option and a goal worth working toward."

While Ethan's full-time role as an Admin III in the Department of Health Science and Movement keeps him busy, he has still found ways to connect with the campus community. Serving as the treasurer of the Classified Staff Council has allowed him to build relationships across campus and represent the voices of staff members.

Scholarship support has been a key part of Ethan's journey. He received both the Classified Staff Council Scholarship and the Wells Fargo Scholarship through the CSU Pueblo Foundation, support that made a tangible difference in his ability to continue his education.

"The difference being made in students' lives is that students in need are being given hope for a brighter tomorrow," Ethan said. "This scholarship feels like a paddle to help navigate the stream."

For Ethan, donor generosity is about more than money. It is about validation.

"Receiving a scholarship as a nontraditional student means a lot," he said. "It tells me that people believe in my ability to finish, even when I'm juggling work, school, and family."

Looking ahead, Ethan is confident about the kind of career he wants to build after graduation. It will be one where family comes first, and where he can make a difference without missing the moments that matter most.

"I want a career that allows me to be present for my family," he said. "I don't want to miss my son's activities. This degree is going to open that door."
